The New Planning System

Planning & Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 introduced:

- Regional Spatial Strategies (RSS) replace County Structure Plans
- Local Development Frameworks (LDF) to replace Unitary and Local Plans



Statutory Development Plan

Based on well established principle of a plan-led system


Consists of:

- Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS)
- Core Strategy Development Plan Documents (DPD)
- Any other DPDs

Statutory Plan forms basis for development control decisions



Regional Spatial Strategy (RSS)



- East of England Plan
- Published 12th May 08
- Sets the development strategy for the region, including Harlow, in terms of:
 - Housing
 - Jobs
 - Transport
 - Environment




East of England Plan Issues for Harlow

- 16,000 additional homes to 2021 for the Harlow Area
- Urban extensions to the south west, east, and north of Harlow
- 56,000 additional jobs (Harlow, Braintree, Brentwood, Chelmsford, Epping Forest, Maldon and Uttlesford)
- Coordinated working with East Hertfordshire DC and Epping Forest DC required to deliver growth requirement






Local Development Framework (LDF)







Development Plan Documents (DPDs)

- Integrated set of policies
- Based on a clear understanding of the economic, social and environmental needs of an area and any constraints on meeting those needs
- Underpinned by an evidence base
- Rigorous procedures of community involvement, consultation & independent examination
- Accompanied by Sustainability Appraisal (SA)
- Assessment through formal examination process



Community Engagement

Consultation important

Production of DPDs should follow the Government's principles for engagement in planning.

Involvement should be:

- Appropriate
- Continuous
- Transparent & accessible
- Planned





Independent Examination

- DPDs are subject to Independent Examination by an Inspector
- In addition to the legal (procedural) requirements, DPDs must be sound

To be "sound" a core strategy should be: JUSTIFIED, EFFECTIVE and consistent with NATIONAL POLICY



The Tests of Soundness

"Justified" means that the document must be:

- founded on a robust and credible evidence base
- the most appropriate strategy when considered against reasonable alternatives

"Effective" means that the document must be:

- deliverable (realistic, identify delivery bodies)
- flexible (respond to changing circumstances)
- able to be monitored

Overall vision – linked to the Sustainable Community Strategy (Harlow 2020)

Sustainability Appraisal Assessment

- LPAs have a statutory duty to promote sustainable development; to balance the competing economic, social & environmental needs of the District
- The SA is a systematic and iterative process and to be fully effective needs to be fully integrated into the plan-making process
- All DPDs require SA; SPDs may require SA



Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD's)

- SPDs are LDDs and form part of the planning framework for the district but <u>not</u> part of the statutory development plan
- Expand on, and give further detail to, policies within DPDs but do <u>not</u> allocate land
- Subject to rigorous community involvement but <u>not</u> subject to independent examination

Local Development Scheme (LDS)

• Timetable for the production of LDF documents

Annual Monitoring Report (AMR)

 Monitors housing delivery & the implementation of policies annually

Statement of Community Involvement (SCI)

• Sets out how the council will involve & engage the community & stakeholders in the planning system
