## Harlow Council Local Development Scheme (New Local Plan Focus) – March 2025

## 1. Introduction

- 1.1 Harlow Council is required to prepare and maintain a Local Development Scheme (LDS) under section 15 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 (as amended). The LDS must provide information such as:
  - the Development Plan Document(s), e.g. a Local Plan, to be prepared
  - the subject matter and geographical area of the DPD(s)
  - the timetable for the preparation and revision of the DPD(s)
- 1.2 The LDS must also be made available publicly and kept up-to-date, along with relevant monitoring, so that the local community and interested parties can keep track of progress.
- 1.3 The Harlow Local Development Plan (HLDP) was adopted in December 2020. The Council subsequently published an LDS in 2021, setting out a timetable for reviewing specific policies referred to by the HLDP Inspector as requiring early revisions, as well as a timetable for a potential Community Infrastructure Levy. The 2023 LDS set out a programme for a review of all policies in the HLDP in accordance with the requirements of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and plan-making system at the time.
- 1.4 In December 2024 the government published a new NPPF and required Councils to submit a new LDS by 6 March 2025. This revised LDS focusses only on the new Local Plan, as required by government, and does not include details of other documents, such as Supplementary Planning Documents. The LDS will be revised at a later date where necessary to include these further details.
- 1.5 The new HLDP will be produced under the proposed new plan-making system, which requires a 30-month period for producing the Local Plan. This is reflected in this LDS and is explained in Section 2.
- 1.6 The new HLDP will include new and/or amended policies, as required, based on:
  - the requirements of the new NPPF (December 2024), National Planning Practice Guidance, emerging National Development Management Policies (due to be consulted on in Spring 2025), and relevant guidance
  - consideration of new technical evidence that has regard to current and future socioeconomic and environmental conditions
  - consideration of town centre specific policies<sup>1</sup>
  - the results of the monitoring of the effectiveness of existing HLDP policies
  - recommendations identified by the Inspector of the HLDP examination

## 2. Changes to the Plan-making System

- 2.1 The Levelling-Up and Regeneration Act 2023 provides primary legislation for implementing a new plan-making system, as mentioned above, which comprises the first major overhaul of the system in over 20 years. A government consultation <a href="webpage">webpage</a><sup>2</sup> provides draft details of this proposed system.
- 2.2 Secondary legislation to enable the new system to be implemented is yet to be published. It is expected this will happen later in 2025. Subsequent versions of this LDS will be amended based on the detail of that legislation, should it differ from the details proposed in the consultation document.
- 2.3 The proposed new plan-making system would require a new Local Plan to be produced under various stages, comprising:
  - informal plan-making
  - scoping and early participation
  - plan visioning and strategy development
  - evidence gathering and drafting the plan
  - engagement, proposing changes, submission
  - examination of the plan
  - adoption of the plan
- 2.4 Within these stages are a number of milestones, including:
  - giving notice of the formal start of the plan-making process, including early participation where consultees are notified and asked about matters that might shape the direction of the Local Plan
  - three gateways, the first two of which are advisory and the third is mandatory (with Planning Inspectors providing assistance)
  - two mandatory public consultations (in addition to the 'early participation' process)
- 2.5 Once notice of formal plan-making has been given, the Council would be required to produce the Local Plan (including consultations, submission, examination and adoption) within a 30-month timeframe. The examination, within this timeframe, would be required to have a maximum length of six months.
- 2.6 Following adoption of the Local Plan, it is expected that monitoring would take place and a return submitted to the government within four years of adoption. Work on an updated Local Plan would be expected to commence within five years of adoption.
- 2.7 The timetable for the production of the new Harlow Local Plan, which aligns with the proposed new plan-making system, can be found on the following page.
